#### Meet EAPL's New Executive Director, Erica Christianson

The Ela Area Public Library Board of Trustees announced the appointment of a new executive director, Erica Christianson. Most recently the deputy director of EAPL, Christianson took over the reins of day-to-day Library operations last September, replacing Lauren Rosenthal, who resigned to pursue other opportunities.

Christianson has been working for the Library almost three decades. She started her professional career as a reference and young adult librarian under Executive Director Carol Larson and has learned about the

inner workings of public library service from the ground up. In 2013, she was promoted to deputy director and served as EAPL's interim director during the global pandemic in 2020, which solidified her success as a leader with a broad skill set and great depth of knowledge and experience.

"The Board believes that Ms. Christianson's deep organizational knowledge, collaborative communication style, and proven leadership skills will provide a seamless transition for the Library and a continued commitment to the success of our recently developed strategic plan," says EAPL Board President Crystal Steker. "We look forward to the leadership and innovation Ms. Christianson will undoubtedly continue to share with our Library patrons, staff and board as our new executive director," Steker adds.

Meet EAPL's Facilities Department, John Carranza, Maria Parra and James Raitz

It's no surprise that one of the busiest departments at EAPL is facilities. From effectively and efficiently providing maintenance to sustaining the day-to-day operations of the 71,000 sq. foot building, John Carranza and his team strive to achieve excellence in all aspects of maintenance, operations and repair. With over 20 years of experience, John, along with his co-workers Maria and James, have been a driving force in the facility's long-term success. Most importantly, their workplace pride has positively impacted not only library staff but the community, too!

We recently asked John a few questions about his job. Here's what he shared with us.

#### What part of your job has changed the most over the last 10 years?

We have stepped up cleaning and disinfecting significantly. Proper ventilation throughout the building has also been a priority.

#### How do you keep the library operating so efficiently?

We are proactive about reducing operational costs as much as possible. Our equipment is well maintained which helps reduce our energy consumption and increase efficiency. I also try to stay on top of industry trends. Sustainability is a top priority. Our water bottle filling stations have been a huge hit with staff and library users.

#### What do you love about your job?

Every day is different. Plus, I love my coworkers and patrons who genuinely care about the space and keeping it clean. It's a great environment!

#### Where are some of your favorite places in the building?

The Reading Room on the second floor, the outdoor patios and our garden areas are my top spots. I love the Reading Room because we have a fireplace, and it's always quiet. Also, we recently upgraded the lighting in there. If you haven't enjoyed our patios, I highly recommend you visit in the spring. There are tables and plenty of seating for lunch or work. Last summer, we replaced the concrete and upgraded the gates. I think our garden areas are beautiful spaces to relax. We often landscape these areas, and I enjoy wtaching the flowers flourish in spring, summer and fall.

#### Any recent improvements?

We recently replaced 45 light fixtures with LEDS in the Reading Room and the children's public areas. Also, we added a new sidewalk on the east side of the parking lot. Concrete improvements were made to the patios along with the addition of new flower beds and a new irrigation system.
